Throughout this school year, Art Club has had meetings both during PRIDE Time and after school. Recently, though, the club participated in the Fort Hays State University Art Day and in the Downtown Art Walk.

On April 16, club members attended FHSU's annual Art Day, with this year being the 50th

anniversary of the event and breaking its record with 72 schools in attendance, which showcased their work. For Hays High School, more than 100 art pieces were entered.

"We bring students from the Art Club and their artworks, both those that have been created during the school year and outside of school," club sponsor Grace Splichal said.

Added this year, judges awarded first, second and third place awards to pieces at each school's booth to

highlight exceptional artworks.

For Hays High, senior Keira Vilaysing earned first, freshman Aubrey Morris was second and junior Jazmine Johnson was third.

"I was proud of my works, and I wanted to be able to share them with others," Johnson said. "I learned that I should 'look deeper' into what I'm creating to be able to show all the true aspects of the final piece of art." The FHSU Department of Art and Design also offered interactive activities for attendees, including ceramic throwing tutorials, mood board creation and stop motion activities, and students were encouraged to participate in the sidewalk chalk competition, with this year's theme being "Mascots in Oz."

Along with Art Day, students wanting to showcase their works that were either made in school or outside of school were encouraged

NEARING COMPLETION

Staff members prepare for pending move to newly built high school

With the new Hays High School set to open in August, crews are finishing construction while staff members are preparing for moving and starting the 2025-2026 school year.

To prepare for the big move, principal Shawn Henderson said that faculty and staff members are responsible for packing their belongings to have them ready to be moved later. While some furniture from the current school will be moved to the new school, other furniture will be left for the middle school teachers to use or for other district buildings to take. As part of their checkout process, teachers must have everything that does need to be moved packed and stored in the designated staging areas by May 23.

"We have begun the process of packing up materials," science teacher Jennifer Olt said. "I have packed up a lot of supplies in my room that I am not going to use anymore and my personal items. We have also begun packing up the back science storeroom.

Once areas of the new building are ready, Henderson said district maintenance staff members will move the items to the new school. One group of maintenance workers will move items from the current building to the new building, and one group will receive items at the new building and move them to the appropriate rooms.

"It's never easy to move, and I think every teacher and department has challenges," Olt said. "For us in the Science Department, we have a lot of lab equipment we need to move, and a lot of it is glassware that is fragile, and items, like skeletons and

models, that don't fit easily in a box. We also have to think carefully about moving all of our chemicals from one building to another."

In addition to the building itself, new parking lots are also being constructed. For teachers, there will be a parking lot in front of the new building on the north side. For students, there will be one parking lot at the new school on the east side of the new building. And, half of the parking lot at the current school will be designated for high school students with a walkway leading to the new building. A median will separate the current high school lot into an area for high school and an area for middle school.

"I think the new parking will be worse than now because the middle school and the high school are both going to be funneling into the same roads," junior Henry Glendenning said.

To accommodate the traffic, 13th Street between Canterbury Drive and Commerce Parkway has been under construction for much of this school year. Crews from the City of Hays are widening the road to allow traffic to flow better, with both the high school and the middle school being on 13th Street when the middle school moves to the current high school building for January 2026.

"They are also hoping to make it so that the turn going into the parking lot from 13th Street is right turn only during peak school hours." Henderson said.

While there is no set date for the new school building to be completed, Henderson said it will be ready for staff and students for the 2025-2026 school year.

"The start of the school year is Aug. 20, and we still plan to be in the new school by then," Henderson said

Travel Club prepares for upcoming Mediterranean trip

As school nears its end and students make summer plans, the International Travel Club has actually been preparing throughout the year for its summer trip to the Mediterranean Coast.

The International Travel Club, sponsored by special education teacher Jennifer Klaus and health secretary Julie Pfannenstiel, includes not only Hays High School students, but also community members, who have a passion for traveling the world.

For the Mediterranean trip, the group of travelers, which includes the two sponsors plus 10 students and nine others, will leave on Tuesday, May 27 and will return on Wednesday, June 4. During the nine-day trip abroad, the travelers will experience the countries of Italy, France and Spain.

"We will discover how Cinque Terre has retained its original charm, learn how the French Riviera became the place to be for generations of rich and famous and see how Antoni Gaudí's surreal architecture has turned the city of Barcelona into one big gallery," Klaus said.

Departing from Wichita on May 27, the group will fly to Milan, Italy, on Day 1. On the second day, they will travel from Milan to Cinque Terre, which is a village on the Italian coast, where they will also spend the third day exploring the area.

After touring those parts of Italy, on Day 4, the group will travel from Cinque Terre to the French Riviera and tour Monaco, where they will visit the Prince of Monaco's Palace, the Monoco

Cathedral and a French perfume factory. On the fifth day, they will remain in the French Riviera, taking a walking tour of Nice, France, and having time to explore the region.

On Day 6, the group will travel from the French Riviera to Barcelona, Spain, which they will tour until they return home on Day 9.

"I am most excited to go to Barcelona

because we did not go to Spain last year, and I want to see how it is different from the previous countries I have been to," said junior Brooklyn Barber, who traveled to other European countries with the group in Summer 2024.

The International Travel Club has been to Europe previously, as they work with Educational Tours, whose programs "help students expand their knowledge of the world around them, discover more about themselves, grow more confident and

independent and understand new people, places and cultures," according to their website. According to Pfannenstiel, the group's trips benefit those attending, especially the participating high school students.

"I love seeing the travelers experience a new culture," Pfannenstiel said. "They come back, realizing how good we have it here in America. It gives them life experiences that they may never get to experience otherwise. Airplanes, trains, subways, metro stations—it helps prepare them for other possible trips, as many get the travel bug. We have some students that end up going on two or three trips with us."

For this summer's tour, the original price of the trip was \$4,869 total, although International Travel Club members are offsetting that cost with fundraising. Fundraising activities have included running concession stands at school activities and hosting BINGO

games on Wednesday nights for students and their family members to volunteer. They have also sold baked goods, barbeque, pizzas and suckers, wrapped holiday gifts, babysat children so parents can shop during the holiday season and sold seasonal greenery. Educational Tours also offers merit-based scholarships of \$1,000 to students who apply and who are selected for the scholarships.

"We have had some [club members] work fundraisers and had quite a bit of the trip

paid for," Pfannenstiel said. "There is also a link that can be sent out once a student signs up to send donations; this has been beneficial to many who use it."

While members have been preparing for this trip, the sponsors are also looking forward to the next trip in Summer of 2026, when they will go to Greece and Turkey for 10 days from May 28, 2026, to June 6, 2026. 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



Public must think critically to combat misinformation

You open social media, and you see a post about how there may be some Illuminati behavior in the depths of the Denver

International Airport, how the gargoyles guarding the baggage claims are actually hidden cameras, how the blue bronco statue outside of the airport is a spawn of Satan or how the tunnels underneath the airport lead to the headquarters of the Illuminati. What do you choose to believe?

While misinformation has always been spread, with the internet and social media, it seems like people in the United States and worldwide have become more

gullible, choosing to believe whatever they see and continuing to share misinformation. To combat this spread of misinformation, we need to improve our society's digital literacy, which is the ability to effectively and safely use digital technologies to find, evaluate and communicate information.

The first step of digital literacy is finding accurate information. With the sheer amount of information available online – both accurate and inaccurate – it is very easy to choose the first source that we see, which makes it possible to consume unreliable content. Instead of believing the first source that they read, people should search the web thoroughly, looking for credible news outlets and official websites.

After finding what appears to be reliable content, the second step is to evaluate the sources. This is when people must use critical thinking by asking questions, analyzing arguments, recognizing bias and fact checking one source with other credible sources. Rather than just accepting the information, people should be open to questioning the source and to finding other sources to corroborate or to disprove the information.

Finally, the last step to digital literacy is communicating information so that others are informed accurately. To share the information, people must know their audience first and change their language appropriately. For example, if they are sharing information with their friends, they will need a different vocabulary than if they were talking to their principal. Next, they need to be clear and concise with the information. Last, they should be respectful by acknowledging others' concerns and questions and being patient.

In our modern world, where there is an immense amount of constant information, it is relatively easy to believe the first thing that you see, like conspiracy theories. However, instead of accepting all the information we see, strengthening our digital literacy can hinder the spread of misinformation.

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

I mean this one in the best way possible. I love that Kennedi is constantly talking about her cats, and I hope she



Coming off championship, Hays Larks set to open summer baseball season

Summer is quickly approaching, which means one of the city's best pastimes is also approaching — that being Hays Larks baseball.

The Larks are coming off of their best season in program history, which included a 22-6 record in the regular season and the franchise's third Rocky Mountain Baseball League championship since joining the league in 2020.

All of this concluded with a 3-0 pool record at the National Baseball Congress (NBC) World Series and two wins in bracket play before getting a come-from-behind victory, 7-3, against the defending champion Hutchinson Monarchs to win their first NBC World Series title.

"I am really excited to see what the team will do because a lot of the same guys are coming back from their championship-winning team last year," senior Carter Graham said.

From last season's success, the Larks had a pair of pitchers and a pair of infielders named to the NBC All-American team. Those pitchers were Garrett Hicks

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and Nolan Wilson, while the infielders were Will Carpenter and Garrett Gruell. Manager Frank Leo was also named Manager of the Year.

The Larks will return 13 players from last year and add 11 newcomers. Many statistical leaders will return, including Kaleb Duncan, who led the team in runs with 30, and Thomas Lyssy, who was the batting average leader.

On the pitcher's mound, the Larks will return Hicks and Wilson, who combined for 26 strikeouts and an ERA of 1.56 in the NBCWorld

Series. The two also played a role in helping the Larks outscore their regular season opponents, 226-110, and get more strikeouts than hits allowed.

Overall, the Larks will return eight pitchers from last year's team, as well as seven position players, two of which play multiple positions. Those include Trent Baker, who switches between pitching and playing outfield and

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Dylan LaRue, who plays as catcher and infielder. And, Leo will return as the Larks' manager – a role that he took over in 1980, which makes this season his 46th season with the Larks.

Senior Reaghan Wamser, who volunteers for the team, said that the Hays Larks "always brings in such a great crowd and creates an awesome atmosphere for the

The Larks will start their 79th season on June 4 with a road game against the Dodge City A's and then another road game the next day against the Newton Rebels. To explain occurrences, conspiracists promote various theories

HITLER ESCAPED TO ARGENTINA. After Nazi Adolph Hitler's 1945 death, conspiracies spread that Hitler had escaped to Argentina. While some Nazis escaped to Argentina after the war to escape punishment, the evidence of having part of Hitler's jaw and teeth proved he died.

EARTH IS FLAT. The Flat Earth Society has existed since the 1950s, believing that the earth is a flat, stationary disc, not a moving ball. The notorious group of Flat Earthers has continued to grow and is fueled even more by access to the internet, where they spread this conspiracy theory.







PAUL IS DEAD. Some Beatles fans say Paul McCartney died in a car crash in 1966 and the band replaced him with a lookalike named Billy Shears. These fans believe that the band then began leaving clues and messages in their music that made nods to McCartney's death.

THE MOON LANDING WAS STAGED. In the mid-1970s, the theory that the 1969 moon landing was faked began to gain traction. The idea was that the moment was staged and filmed here on Earth so that the United States could get ahead of the Soviets in the space race.





ILLUMINATI CONTROL EVERYTHING. The conspiracy about Illuminati pulls from "The Illuminatus!" trilogy from 1975 and holds the belief that certain elites are part of a secret society that work to pull strings in important events, with their headquarters being the Denver airport.

AREA 51 EXISTS. In 1989, a man named Bob Lazar claimed to have worked at Area 51 in Nevada on extraterrestrial technology that came from UFO crashes. This fueled the belief that Area 51 has alien spaceships and some alien bodies that the U.S. government is hiding.





PRINCESS DIANA WAS MURDERED. Since the car accident in 1997 that caused the deaths of Princess Diana and her boyfriend, conspiracy theorists have said that the British Royal Family planned the highspeed accident in Paris to kill them to keep them from getting married.

WORLD LEADERS ARE REPTILES. In 1998, conspiracist author David Icke wrote a book explaining his theory that the world leaders are actually alien lizards wearing "people suits" who are working together to develop a worldwide fascist state.





WE LIVE IN MATRIX. The idea that we all live in a simulation is based on the 1999 movie "The Matrix." Some people believe that the world is run by a giant computer and that humans have a fake reality. That poses the question: are we real, or are we just part of the simulation?

BIRDS ARE NOT REAL. Initially starting as satire, this movement was meant to show how ridiculous conspiracies are. In 2017, a psychology student started the conspiracy that birds were replaced with drones to see if people would believe anything they were told, and some people did.
